The Northern Lehigh Food Bank serves the Northern Lehigh School District in Lehigh County, as well as referrals from the Northern Lehigh Pastoral Association, Inc.

Office/Delivery Hours: Tuesday 9:00 am to 1:00 pm and other hours by appointment. Food Distribution: 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Thursday from 4:00 pm to 5:45 pm; and Last Saturday from 9:30 to 11:15 am each month. Also 2nd & 4th Mondays from 1:00 pm to 2:45 pm. New clients please call to register.

Because of the support of the community, we have also been able to give additional food for Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. We will also be collecting school supplies and individual food items for kids packs for the summer and new either handmade or store bought gloves, hats, scarves, fuzzy socks, and blankets/afghans/laprobes.

The household sizes are from 1-11 people. Last year we served about 170 households per month which is about 442 people monthly. Food and cash donations are always needed and appreciated. We no longer accept clothing, books, toys, furniture, or household items. The Northern Lehigh Food Bank is located at 7884 Center St., Emerald.


Slatington Lions Club



Watershed-Friendly Deicing

As autumn gives way to winter, we'll once again face the dreaded challenge of clearing snow and ice from our sidewalks, patios, and driveways. One popular approach is to apply chemical deicing materials. However, there are other ways to keep paved surfaces on our property safe, while also minimizing pollution to our waterways.



Dangers of Deicers

Precipitation, including snow and ice, transports pollutants into our waterways in the same manner as does rain. The only difference is the time it takes for the snow and ice to melt. Once melted, runoff flows across paved surfaces, washing deicers and other harmful pollutants into the storm sewer system or roadside gutters and eventually discharging untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, paddling, and drinking water.

One could argue that using chemical deicers on your walk or driveway may not cause much harm individually. But when you consider all the deicing compounds applied over the course of the winter throughout the Township and beyond, we're talking about a significant amount of salt and other chemical pollutants entering our streams, rivers, ponds, and lakes. These pollutants can be toxic to the animals living in and around the receiving water as well as to many of the plants in your yard and along our roadways.

Did you know? Chloride is virtually impossible to remove from a waterbody. Once it's there, it's there for good. Just one teaspoon of salt contains enough chloride to pollute five gallons of fresh water forever.

Not All Deicers are Created Equal

- Deicers come in several forms, each with their own advantages and disadvantages.
- Rock salt (sodium chloride) is the most commonly used but contains cyanide as an anti-caking agent that can be toxic to aquatic life and is the most harmful for plants.
- Calcium chloride is considered a better choice than rock salt because it does not contain cyanide. However, it can also harm animals and plants. Calcium chloride costs about three times more than rock salt but you only need to use about one-third as much.
- Magnesium chloride is considered the least toxic deicing salt because it contains less chloride than either rock salt or calcium chloride, making it safer for animals and plants.
- Calcium magnesium acetate (CMA) is considered the best overall choice for safely melting ice. It is less toxic than deicers containing chloride but can cost considerably more than rock salt.

Less is More

- Follow the label directions. If only a handful of product per square yard is needed, using more isn't more effective, just more expensive.
- Spread deicer before snow and ice start to accumulate.
- Remove as much snow and ice as possible before applying deicer.
- Don't use rock salt within 5-10 feet of salt-sensitive plants.
- · Once you establish a dry, safe route to your house, block off slippery areas you won't be walking on!
- Never use fertilizer as a deicer. Nutrients in fertilizer and urea-containing deicers promote algae growth which can lead to reduced oxygen levels in our waterways.

Watershed-Friendly Alternatives

- Chemical deicers are not your only option. The following are a few watershed-friendly alternatives.
- Old-fashioned elbow grease is the best way to remove snow and ice from your property. Shovel early and often during a snowstorm so that the snow has less chance to become compacted and/or turn to ice.
- Warm water mixed with table salt or water conditioning salt
- A light application of sand will improve traction on slippery areas
- A heavy-duty waterproof tarp or plastic sheet can be used to cover small areas (such as your steps)

- Peters Elementary teacher Marshelle George, delighted the youngsters with stories at our Dr. Seuss's Birthday Celebration on March 2. The library provided snacks, goodie bags, stickers, certificates, and a photo op with Thing One and Thing Two.

Reminder: If you have applied for a library card and have not received it, please stop by the library during open hours to pick it up. Library cards are free to residents of the Northern Lehigh School District area.

We thank everyone who has responded to the community and Century Club letters with a donation. In addition to these donations, we appreciated the support from the following fundraisers: Pampered Chef, Thirty-One, Basket Social, and our ongoing book sale. The Slatington Public Library is a non-profit 501(c)(3) corporation. We continue to seek grants and alternative money sources. Board member Joyce Thompson attended a grant-writing conference at Lehigh University, sponsored by Senator Bob Casey.

Township Clean-up

Township clean up will be held on Saturday, June 1st, 2024 from 8:00AM to 12:00PM. Items that will be accepted are old furniture and trash. Items that will be recycled are white goods, metals, electronics, and tires. We also accept old batteries, which are used to offset the purchase of batteries for Township equipment. Tires are now \$2.00 each. Large truck or tractor tires are now \$10.00. Tires should not have rims. No commercial or race tires. There will be a \$15.00 charge for removal of freon. Electronics will be accepted with fees.



TV prices are \$40.00 for under 42". TV's (in wooden cabinet, Projection, Over 42", TV Tubes (broken TV's) is \$58.00. No construction material will be allowed, this would include insulation, plaster board, etc. This will be the only clean up for the year and it is not known, at this time, if there will be other fees involved with collection. There will be a charge of \$25.00 for every mattress accepted. Starting in April the Township will be open to drop off yard waste on Saturdays between the hours of 8am-12pm.

Fall Leaf pick up:

Soon after the leaves start falling, the township will start our leaf pick up. Please remember to place your leaf piles as close to the road or curb as possible. Also be sure that leaf pile only contain leaves, vacuuming up rocks, branches or debris can be harmful to our staff and equipment. The township cannot safely pick up leaves on the following state roads: PA 873, Mountain Road or Old Post Road. Before putting leaves along any state road, please call the township to see if pick up will be possible. If you prefer to drop off your leaves or brush, this can be done at the township yard on Center Street between the hours of 7:30am and 3:30pm, Monday – Friday. Please be aware that brush burning is prohibited and leaf burning is only permitted during the month of November. Leaf burning in the VC zoning district is prohibited all year. Please check our web site for a copy of the complete burn ordinance and our yard hours.

The Sanctuary at Haafsville

Washington Township has a partnership with The Sanctuary of Haafsville to provide contacts for the Trap/Neuter/Return of feral/wild cats. The Sanctuary is a non-profit, no kill animal shelter located in Breiningsville, PA. Currently, The Sanctuary does not have a team to help with the trapping of feral/wild cats.

Information for No Nonsense Neutering will be provided or you can contact No Nonsense Neutering directly at www.nnnlv.com and search the community cats tab. For feral cats in Washington Township, The Sanctuary will loan traps to residents to assist in trapping feral/wild cats. Trapping will be done by citizens and trapping volunteers in the community.

If you find a friendly stray cat, contact The Sanctuary to see if it can be accepted into the shelter as space permits. Please note, there may be a wait list. Every attempt is made to find the cat's owner prior to vetting and making them available for adoption.

Property & Per Capita Taxes

Township property tax, School property tax, and Per Capita tax are issued and collected yearly. Please direct all questions regarding these taxes to the new Tax Collector, Ashley Wilk. Sally A. Mantz is retired effective January 31st, 2024, and Ashley was appointed as the new Tax Collector commencing on February 6th, 2024 for Washington Township. Her phone number is 610-767-8108 Ex. 6. Office hours will be held at the Municipal Township Building (7951 Center Street, Emerald, PA 18080) on Wednesday's from 4:30 PM until 6:00 PM or by appointment.

NOTE: Mortgage companies pay township, county, & school taxes – township taxes are paid by your mortgage companies so do not pay them or duplicate payments are made. Most mortgage companies receive your tax amounts electronically without receiving the tax bill from you, but it is recommended for you to check with them. Per Capita taxes are not paid by your mortgage company – you are responsible to pay them.

- School Real Estate is Issued July 1
- Township and School Per Capitas are on the same bill and are issued together July 1

In an emergency, can the ambulance quickly find your residence, access your driveway, and get to your house? The extra minutes emergency response teams spend searching for your address or trying to navigate your driveway can make a real difference for a loved one in need. Ordinance #63 requires all property owners to post their address on their mailbox or building face. Make sure your driveway is maintained and is clear of obstructions such as low branches so that the emergency equipment can get to your house. Emergency Preparedness: POWER OUTAGES

Power outages can occur during any season and have different effects so it is helpful to be prepared at all times.

Before a power outage occurs:

- Make sure you have an emergency kit created. You can find what you should put in it at ready.pa.gov
- Always have cellular devices charged
- Have enough water in the home for 4 days along with food (that may not require electricity to heat)
- If you have a generator, always maintain enough fuel and test the generator monthly
- Keep your car's fuel level up
- If you have electric medical equipment, ensure you have a battery or manual way of handling the equipment.
- Have a working battery-operated radio so you can receive updates for shelters and evacualtions if necessary

During the power outage:


- Utilize flashlights rather than candles due to the risk of fire
- Keep refrigerators/freezers closed so the temperature can remain consistent
- Dress in layers according to time of year
- Disconnect appliances so that there no surges when power does return
- If using a generator, remember to not have the generator inside and away from your home so fumes do not enter your home

Once power returns:

- Throw away any food that may have dropped below approved temperatures
- Slowly turn electrical devices back on
- If you have natural gas and need someone turn it back on, have someone approved come out
- Restock any supplies you may have used out of your emergency kit or go bags.


