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Park Renovations



The Northern Lehigh Food Bank serves the Northern Lehigh School District in Lehigh County, as well as referrals from the Northern Lehigh Pastoral Association, Inc.

Office/Delivery Hours: Tuesday 9:00 am to 1:00 pm and other hours by appointment. Food Distribution: 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Thursday from 4:00 pm to 6:00 pm; and Last Saturday from 9:30 to 11:30am each month. Also 2nd & 4th Mondays from 1:00 pm to 3:00 pm.

Volunteer opportunities maybe available at the food bank.

Because of the support of the community, we have also been able to give additional food for Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. We will also be collecting school supplies and individual food items for kids packs for the summer and new either handmade or store bought gloves, hats, scarves, fuzzy socks and blankets/afghans/laprobes.

Because of COVID 19 the food is packed and taken out to the clients vehicles.

What is stormwater runoff?



Stormwater runoff occurs when precipitation from rain or snowmelt flows over the ground. Impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks, and streets prevent stormwater from naturally soaking into the ground.

Why is stormwater runoff a problem?




Stormwater can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a lake, stream, river, wetland, or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water.

The effects of pollution

Polluted stormwater runoff can have many adverse effects on plants, fish, animals, and people

- · Sediment can cloud the water and make it difficult or impossible for aquatic plants to grow Sediment also can destroy aquatic habitats.
- · Excess nutrients can cause algae blooms. When algae die. they sink to the bottom and decompose in a process that removes oxygen from the water. Fish and other aquatic organisms can't exist in water with low dissolved oxygen levels.
- · Bacteria and other pathogens can wash Into swimming areas and create health hazards, often making beach closures necessary
- Debris—plastic bags, six-pack rings, bottles, and cigarette butts-washed into waterbodies can choke, suffocate, or disable aquatic life like ducks, fish, turtles, and birds
- Household hazardous wastes like insecticides, pesticides, paint, solvents, used motor oil, and other auto fluids can poison aquatic life. Land animals and people can become sick or die from eating diseased fish and shellfish or ingesting polluted water.





Stormwater Pollution Solutions



Recycle or properly dispose of household products that contain chemicals, such as insecticides, posticides, paint, solvents, and used motor oil and other auto Muids. Don't pour them onto the ground or into storm drains.

Lawn care


Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. In addition, yard clippings and leaves can wash

into storm drains and contribute nutrients and organic matter to streams.

- Don't overwater your lawn. Consider using a soaker hose instead of a sprinkler
- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts. Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever
- Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams
- · Cover piles of dirt or mulch being used in landscaping projects

Auto care

Washing your car and degreasing auto parts at home can send detergents and other contaminants through the storm sewer system. Dumping automotive fluids into storm drains has the same result as dumping the materials directly into a waterbody



 Repair leaks and dispose of used auto fluids and batteries at designated drop-off or recycling locations.

Septic systems



systems release nutrients and pathogens (bacteria and viruses) that can be picked up by stormwater and discharged into nearby waterbodies. Pathogens can cause public health problems and environmental concerns

- · Inspect your system every 3 years and pump your tank as necessary (every 3 to 5 years).
- Don't dispose of household hazardous waste in sinks or toilets.

Pet waste

Pet waste can be bacteria and excess nutrients in local waters

· When walking your pet, remember to pick up the waste and dispose of it properly. Flushing pet waste is the best disposal method. Leaving pet waste on the ground increases public health risks by allowing harmful bacteria and nutrients to wash into the storm drain and eventually into local waterbodies

Education is essential to changing people's behavior. Signs and markers more storm drains o that pollutants entering the drains well be carried untersted into a local waterbody.

Residential landscaping

Permeable Pavement-Traditional concrete and asphalt don't allow water to soak into the ground. Instead these surfaces rely on storm drains to divert unwanted water. Permeable pavement systems allow rain and snowmelt to soak through decreasing stormwater runoff.

Rain Barrels—You can collect rainwater from rooftops in mosquitoproof containers. The water can be used later on lawn or garden areas.

Rain Gardens and Grassy Swales-Specially designed areas planted



with native plants can provide natural places for rainwater to collect and soak into the ground. Rain from rooftop areas or paved areas can be diverted into these areas rather than into storm drains

Vegetated Filter Strips—Filter strips are areas of native grass or plants created along roadways or streams. They trap the pollutants stormwater picks up as it flows across driveways and streets

Michael Embry once said, "I don't have to look far to find treasures. I discover them every time I visit a library." The Slatington Public Library Board of Directors and librarians Rosanne Pugh and Louise Bechtel stand firm in assuring our patrons that there are many "treasures" to be found in our historic building on 650 Main Street in Slatington.



Firstly, the library promotes many programs free to our community such as the following: Monthly Book Club meetings the first Monday of every month at 1:00 PM, Fall and Spring Story Hour (6 sessions each season), Genealogy Group meeting the second Saturday of each month at 11:00 AM, Friends of the Library (hoping to regroup soon), Teen Advisory Board (seeking teens grades 7-12), The Wonderful World of Wildlife summer program, the Annual Donald D. Owens Reading Challenge (February 18-May 31), Summer Reading Incentive Program with cash prizes, a Dr. Seuss birthday celebration each March, readings by Mrs. Santa and gifts for the children the first Friday in December, and a game day for students in grades 7-12. Continue to check our website for specific details about these ongoing programs.

Secondly, the library many services and resources to our patrons include the following: technical support and consultation from our professional staff, assistance with tax forms, APRISE – assistance with Medicare Part B Enrollment, online card catalogue, access to computers, access to Carbon Lehigh Downloadable Library such as eBooks, audiobooks, and magazines, Access PA – borrow books from other PA libraries, Lehigh-Carbon Library Cooperative which provides access to many public libraries such as Palmerton, Parkland, Jim Thorpe to name a few, and curbside service upon request.

Important update about the Elevator Project – As of February 1, 2023, we were waiting to review the updated plans and to approve yet another price quote. Although this has been a arduous project, we remain resilient to complete this project with optimizing the use of our facility and to ensuring the safety of our staff. Thus far we have raised \$111,360 for this project, and we continue to apply for grants, fundraise in creative ways such as our Thirty-One Fundraiser which raised \$678 in November, 2022 to fulfill this project. With gratitude, we appreciate the community's monetary support and its patience with this delay to a vital capital improvement to our library.

When we lost our dedicated Board Member John Kisthardt in November, 2021, his family wished to donate money towards a project close to John's heart – the restoration of the skylight original to our building at a estimated cost of \$25,000. In addition to the family's donation, we applied for a grant to help John's family achieve this goal in his memory. In addition, we applied for a grant to repaint the ceiling on the first floor of the library.

At a ceremony in December 2022, we welcomed the addition of eight names to the Louise I. Hallman Memorial Plaque. Names are added to the plaque when at least \$1000 is given in honor/in memory of a loved one. Those honored in memory of were the following: Janice Altrichter, John Kisthardt, Donald G. Roberts, Doris and Nick Smith, and William A. Steckel. Slatington residents Diane and David Schnaars' names were engraved in honor of their generous donation. Light refreshments were served, and Board Members Hali Kuntz, Marilyn Steckel, Lynne Fedorcha, and Renee Evans provided commentary on the honorees while many family members and friends of the honorees were in attendance. The staff and Board of Directors recognizes and appreciates this philanthropic endeavor by the families and look forward to sponsoring more ceremonies in then future and furthering our mission of literacy and service.

Township Clean-up

Township clean up will be held on June 3rd, 2023 from 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM. Items that will be accepted are old furniture and trash. Items that will be recycled are white goods, metals, electronics, and tires. We also accept old batteries, which are used to offset the purchase of batteries for Township equipment. Each tire is now \$1.00 a piece. Large truck or tractor tires are \$5.00. Tires should not have rims. No commercial or race tires. There will be a \$15.00 charge for removal of freon. Electronics will be accepted with fees.



TV prices are \$40.00 for under 42". TV's (in wooden cabinet, Projection, Over 42", TV Tubes (broken TV's) is \$58.00. No construction material will be allowed, this would include insulation, plaster board, etc. This will be the only clean up for the year and it is not known, at this time, if there will be other fees involved with collection. There will be a charge of \$25.00 for every mattress accepted. Starting in April the Township will be open to drop off yard waste on Saturdays between the hours of 8am-12pm.

Fall Leaf pick up:

Soon after the leaves start falling, the township will start our leaf pick up. Please remember to place your leaf piles as close to the road or curb as possible. Also be sure that leaf pile only contain leaves, vacuuming up rocks, branches or debris can be harmful to our staff and equipment. The township cannot safely pick up leaves on the following state roads: PA 873, Mountain Road or Old Post Road. Before putting leaves along any state road, please call the township to see if pick up will be possible. If you prefer to drop off your leaves or brush, this can be done at the township yard on Center Street between the hours of 7:30am and 3:30pm, Monday – Friday. Please be aware that brush burning is prohibited and leaf burning is only permitted during the month of November. Leaf burning in the VC zoning district is prohibited all year. Please check our web site for a copy of the complete burn ordinance and our yard hours.

The Sanctuary at Haafsville

Washington Township has signed a contract to provide animal control with The Sanctuary at Haafsville, a non-profit, no kill animal shelter in Breinigsville, PA. Approximately 1,000 dogs and cats found their forever homes through the Sanctuary in 2022.

Should you find a stray dog in Washington Township, please call The Sanctuary at 484-285-5445 and choose option 1. A Sanctuary representative will provide information on next steps. A search is done immediately to find the owner and if no owner is found, after 72 hours, the dog is vetted and available for adoption.

The Sanctuary at Haafsville can also help with stray or feral cats. Information for No Nonsense Neutering will be provided or you can contact No Nonsense Neutering directly at www.nnnlv.org and search the community cats tab. For feral trapped cats, there is no copay for Washington Township residents and services include spay/neuter, ear tip, and rabies vaccine. Both NNN and The Sanctuary have loaner traps available for a refundable fee.

If you find a friendly stray cat, contact The Sanctuary to see if it can be accepted into the shelter as space permits. Please note, there may be a wait list. Every attempt is made to find the cat's owner prior to vetting and making them available for adoption.

Property & Per Capita Taxes

Township property tax, School property tax and Per Capita tax are issued and collected yearly by Sally A. Mantz, 4202 Main Street, PO Box 155 Slatedale, PA 18079. County property tax is collected by the county. These taxes are NOT collected at the Washington Township Municipal Building. Questions regarding these taxes should be directed to Sally Mantz at 610-767-4533.

NOTE: Mortgage companies pay township, county, & school taxes – township taxes are paid by your mortgage companies so do not pay them or duplicate payments are made. Most mortgage companies receive your tax amounts electronically without receiving the tax bill from you, but it is recommended for you to check with them. Per Capita taxes are not paid by your mortgage company – you are responsible to pay them.

- Township Real Estate is Issued April 1
- School Real Estate is Issued July 1
- Township and School Per Capitas are on the same bill and are issued together July 1

Delinquencies are turned over to the following companies and once turned over these companies are who need to be contacted for resolution

- Township Elite Revenue Services
- Township Per Capita Berkheimer Associates
- School Portnoff Associates
- School Per Capita Statewide Tax Recovery
- Township Street Light and Hydrant Creditech Collection Agency if applicable



Local Service Tax (LST) and Earned Income Tax

Self-employed and businesses within the township should continue to collect and remit to the Washington Township Office. An agreement has been made with the Northern Lehigh School District to collect their LST Tax. The Township portion (\$5) and the School portion (\$5) – a total of \$10.00 should be sent to Washington Township. Please note that Central Tax Bureau (which is not in business anymore) or Berkheimer Associates does not collect this tax for us.

Residents' filing of EARNED INCOME TAX (1%) should be sent to Berkheimer Associates. Pennsylvania passed Act 32 which made it mandatory that all local EIT be county based and Lehigh County selected Berkheimer.





Help Us Help You

In an emergency, can the ambulance quickly find your residence, access your driveway, and get to your house? The extra minutes emergency response teams spend searching for your address or trying to navigate your driveway can make a real difference for a loved one in need. Ordinance #63 requires all property owners to post their address on their mailbox or building face. Make sure your driveway is maintained and is clear of obstructions such as low branches so that the emergency equipment can get to your house. Excessive swales in your driveway can also be an issue for the larger emergency vehicles. Contact the NOVA 610-262-1075 if you would like a number sign for your home.

Emergency Preparedness: POWER OUTAGES

Horizontal

Power outages can occur during any season and have different effects so it is helpful to be prepared at all times.

Before a power outage occurs:

Sign made: (Circle one)

- Make sure you have an emergency kit created. You can find what you should put in it at ready.pa.gov
- Always have cellular devices charged
- Have enough water in the home for 4 days along with food (that may not require electricity to heat)
- If you have a generator, always maintain enough fuel and test the generator monthly

Vertical

- Keep you car's fuel level up
- If you have electric medical equipment, ensure you have a battery or manual way of handling the equipment.
- $\bullet \ Have \ a \ working \ battery-operated \ radio \ so \ you \ can \ receive \ updates \ for \ shelters \ and \ evacual tions$

if necessary

During the power outage:

- Utilize flashlights rather than candles due to the risk of fire
- Keep refrigerators/freezers closed so the temperature can remain consistent
- Dress in layers according to time of year
- Disconnect appliances so that there no surges when power does return
- If using a generator, remember to not have the generator inside and away from your home so fumes do not enter your home


Once power returns:

- Throw away any food that may have dropped below approved temperatures
- Slowly turn electrical devices back on
- If you have natural gas and need someone turn it back on, have someone approved come out
- Restock any supplies you may have used out of your emergency kit or go bags.
